1<sup>st</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, Oh, how the wind does blow! It stings the toes, And bites the nose, And over the ground we go.

4<sup>rd</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, With a clear blue winter sky, The dogs do bark, And children hark, As we go jingling by. Lyrics or words to a popular Thanksgiving song by Lydia Maria Child (1802-1880), first published in 1845.

If you know the tune for this song, sing it after reading the poem.



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5<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, To have a first-rate play -Hear the bells ring Ting-a-ling-ding, Hurra for Thanksgiving Day!

6<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood -No matter for winds that blow; Or if we get The sleigh upset, Into a bank of snow.

7<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, To see little John and Ann; We will kiss them all, And play snow-ball, And stay as long as we can.

8<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, Trot fast, my dapple gray! Spring over the ground, Like a hunting hound, For 'tis Thanksgiving Day!



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9<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river and through the wood, And straight through the barn-yard gate; We seem to go Extremely slow, It is so hard to wait.

10<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, Old Jowler hears our bells; He shakes his pow, With a loud bow-wow, And thus the news he tells.

11<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river, and through the wood, When grandmother sees us come, She will say, Oh dear, The children are here, Bring a pie for everyone.

12<sup>th</sup> stanza:

Over the river and through the wood, Now grandmother's cap I spy! Hurra for the fun! Is the pudding done? Hurra for the pumpkin pie!

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**rhyme pattern:** Every poem has a rhyme pattern. Each line is given a letter in the alphabet. When two lines rhyme, the letter is the same. For example, the song's  $1^{st}$  stanza has a rhyme scheme of abccb. This means that the second line rhymes with the  $5^{th}$ , and the  $3^{rd}$  line rhyme with the  $4^{th}$ :
